❖ **Strategic Plan Briefing – Annie Hyrila**

- The current strategic plan started in 2023 and will go through 2028. The plan was formed out of work sessions with CoC and community members to determine focus areas.
- Since the plan is halfway complete, Partners for HOME wanted to look back at what has been accomplished, what areas are in progress and need prioritization, and what areas are no longer aligned with current work. These changes have been presented to the Governing Council and the Partners for HOME board.
  - *Goal 1 is to reduce unsheltered homelessness.* The annual KPI is the PIT unsheltered count, but quarterly KPIs will now include the number of individuals on the chronic by-name list, the number of encampment resolutions, the number of chronically homeless households housed, and the number of unsheltered households housed.
  - *Goal 2 is to prevent, rapidly exit, and divert families from homelessness.* The existing KPIs are the system performance measure 1 and the youth PIT and family counts. The length of time from identification to housing will now be incorporated as a quarterly KPI.
    - A question was asked if ClientTrack can be used to create an app so that families can directly communicate about their situation, upload their documents, etc. Annie responded that the idea sounds good, but there were doubts about implementation because of confidentiality. Anyone who is interested in helping with thinking about this idea should reach out to Jasmine Cunningham ([jcunningham@partnersforhome.org](mailto:jcunningham@partnersforhome.org)) to get added to the Family Workgroup.
  - *Goal 3 is to provide all veterans with housing and supportive services.* The annual KPI is the USICH homelessness measure. The new quarterly KPIs will include the length of time from identification to housing and the number of veterans on the by-name list.
  - *Goal 4 is to prevent returns to homelessness.* The annual KPIs were the system performance measures 2 and 7. The new quarterly KPIs will include information around complex needs, Project HEAL, and landlord engagements.
    - It was noted that clients being able to see where they are on the housing queue and being able to upload documents themselves could be beneficial. This notion was previously brought up in the Coordinated Entry Refinement committee.

❖ **New CoC Policies – Brianna Flowers & Kevin Briskin**

- *1:1:1 Prioritization Policy*
  - This policy is specific to the 111 Moreland property. This project has an unusual layout physically, and there was a need for youth or people exiting from youth specific permanent housing. This policy implements a prioritization for youth or individuals who are exiting youth specific supportive housing.
  - The eligibility requirements do not change; this policy just shifts the prioritization for the pool of clients who can be referred. The prioritization is as follows: youth, people who are exiting youth-specific programs, people who are 25 – 30, and then the housing queue.
- *RRH to PSH Transfer Policy*
  - This policy addresses a grey area in existing policy and formally establishes a process for how individuals are transferred from rapid rehousing to permanent supportive housing. Some individuals move into RRH

after receiving a coordinated entry assessment but then are deemed a better fit for PSH after working with a RRH provider. The RRH provider may determine that a referral to PSH is more appropriate since the client won't be able to exit RRH to self-sufficiency.

- This policy lays out the process for how the RRH provider would request an eligibility reexamination. The project manager at Partners for HOME would do an initial assessment to see if a transfer is feasible.

- *AI Policy*

- Partners for HOME developed guidance around AI to help protect client confidentiality and sensitive information. This will reduce risk uniformly across the CoC and prevent unauthorized capture of sensitive information.
- AI notetakers and recordings may be used in public community meetings, strategic planning sessions, policy discussions, and meetings with participant consent. They are prohibited in case conferencing, coordinated entry discussions, HMIS data reviews, and meetings involving personal identifying information or client narratives.
- Meeting hosts will review meeting settings before sessions involving client data, monitor for unauthorized AI tools in the meeting, remove participants using prohibited recording tools, and disable embedded AI features when required.
- Participants should notify the group when any AI tool is active on their device, avoid using AI note takers in prohibited meeting types, ask before joining with an AI assistant enabled, and report concerns to the meeting host immediately.
- Providers and facilitators should include AI tool guidance in pre-meeting communications, establish clear expectations at the start of sensitive meetings, and document and escalate any policy violations.

- *Client Grievance Policy*

- The CoC developed a grievance policy to provide clients with a clear and accessible process for raising concerns related to Partners for HOME or the homeless response system at large.
- Concerns that can be submitted include denial or unfair treatment, service quality, discrimination or harassment, confidentiality/privacy concerns, and lack of responsiveness. Grievances unrelated to Partners for HOME or the Atlanta CoC system at large should follow the specific organization's grievance policy.

- As part of the Youth Homelessness Systems Improvement (YHSI) initiative, Partners for HOME is partnering with Morehouse School of Medicine and the Atlanta and Fulton County Youth Action Boards to gather feedback from youth ages 18–24 who have experienced homelessness or housing instability. The survey is designed to help identify service gaps, barriers to access, and opportunities for system improvement across the Atlanta and Fulton County CoCs.
- We are looking for opportunities to visit partner organizations during existing youth programming, workshops, or meetings to administer the 5–10-minute survey onsite. Gift cards will be provided to participants as a thank you for their time and feedback. - ❖ **Georgia Unify & HMIS Integration Demo – Shirelle King, Megan Johnson, & Lori Fassman**
  - Representatives from GaHIN presented an overview of GeorgiaUnify, a platform focused on improving coordination between healthcare and social service systems to support whole-person care.
  - GaHIN shared that the network connects healthcare providers, state agencies, hospitals, community organizations, and other partners across Georgia to facilitate data sharing and care coordination.
  - The presentation highlighted GeorgiaUnify’s key capabilities, including:
    - Social determinants of health (SDOH) screenings
    - Community resource directories
    - Referral management and tracking
    - Reporting and analytics
    - Longitudinal whole-person records integrating clinical and social care data
  - Presenters discussed ongoing HMIS integration efforts and noted that resource information from Greater Atlanta 211, Central Georgia 211, and Continuums of Care is being incorporated into the platform.
  - Attendees received a demonstration of the GeorgiaUnify platform and participated in a Q&A discussion regarding implementation and data-sharing capabilities.

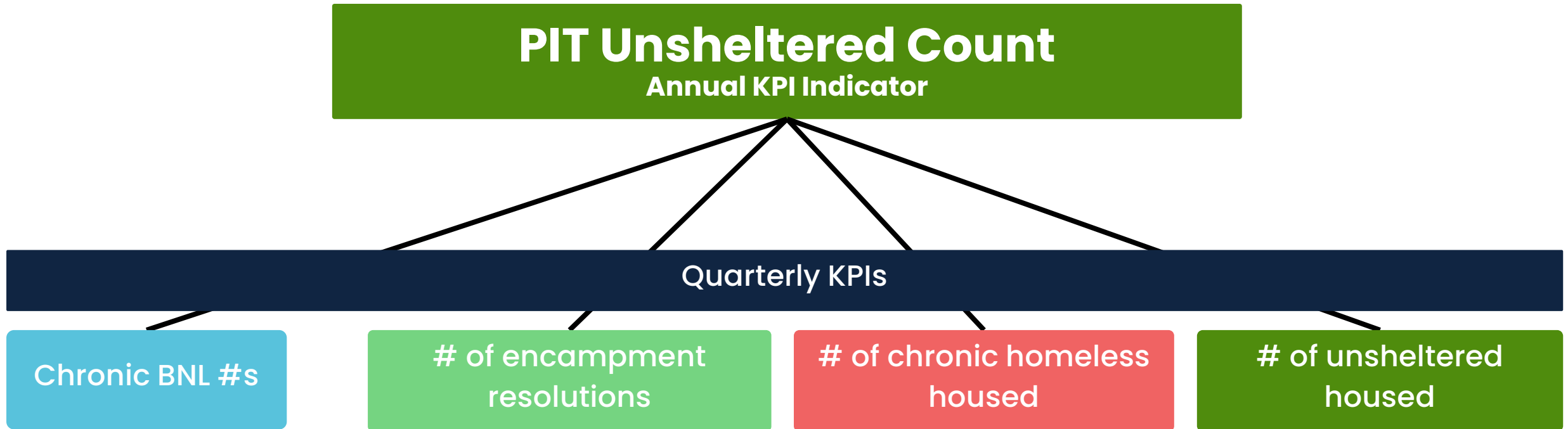

With the increased use of AI tools in meetings, PfH developed guidance to help protect client confidentiality and sensitive information.



## Confidentiality

Protect client information  
in all meeting contexts



## Privacy

Prevent unauthorized capture

# What the AI Policy Covers...

## AI Note Takers & Recording Tools

### ✓ PERMITTED

- ✓ Public community meetings
- ✓ Strategic planning sessions
- ✓ Policy discussions (no client data)
- ✓ Meetings with participant consent

### ✗ PROHIBITED

- ✗ Case conferencing
- ✗ Coordinated Entry discussions
- ✗ HMIS data reviews
- ✗ Meetings involving PII or client narratives

# Who is Responsible?



## Meeting Hosts

- Review meeting settings before sessions involving client data
- Monitor for unauthorized AI tools in the meeting
- Remove participants using prohibited recording tools
- Disable embedded AI features (ex. Teams Copilot) when required



## Participants

- Notify the group when any AI tool is active on your device
- Avoid using AI note takers in prohibited meeting types
- Ask before joining with an AI assistant enabled
- Report concerns to the meeting host immediately



## Providers & Facilitators

- Include AI tool guidance in pre-meeting communications
- Establish clear expectations at the start of sensitive meetings
- Document and escalate any policy violations
- Direct implementation questions to PfH for follow-up

# 3 Things to Remember About the AI Policy...

This applies to case conferencing, Coordinated Entry, HMIS reviews, and any meeting where PII or client narratives are discussed.

Check your settings before every sensitive meeting. Disable embedded AI features when required.

# What Types of Concerns May Be Submitted?



## Denial or Unfair Treatment

Denial of services or concerns about unfair treatment in the system



## Service Quality

Concerns about the quality or appropriateness of services received



## Discrimination or Harassment

Any experience of discrimination, harassment, or bias



## Confidentiality / Privacy

Concerns about how personal information was handled or shared



## Lack of Responsiveness

Unresolved concerns or lack of follow-through by an agency

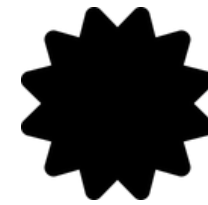

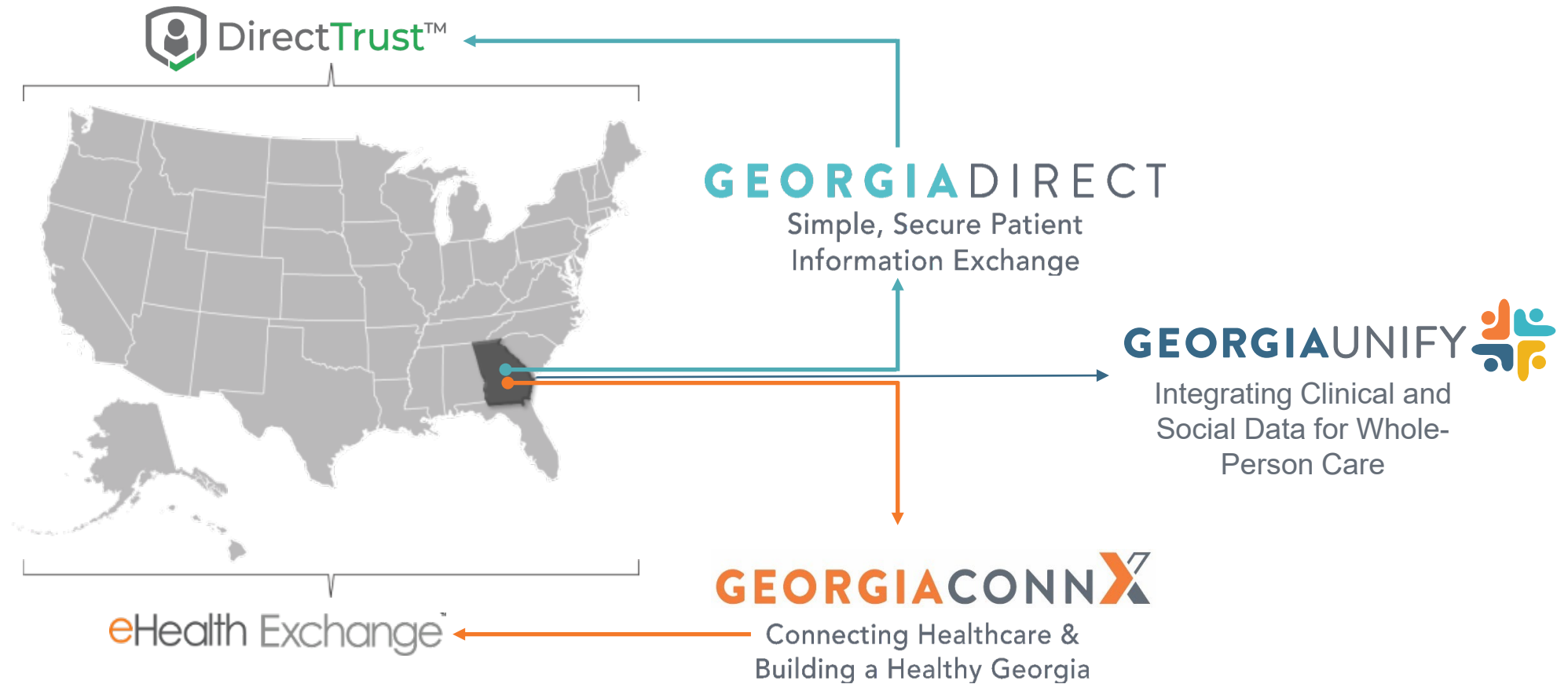

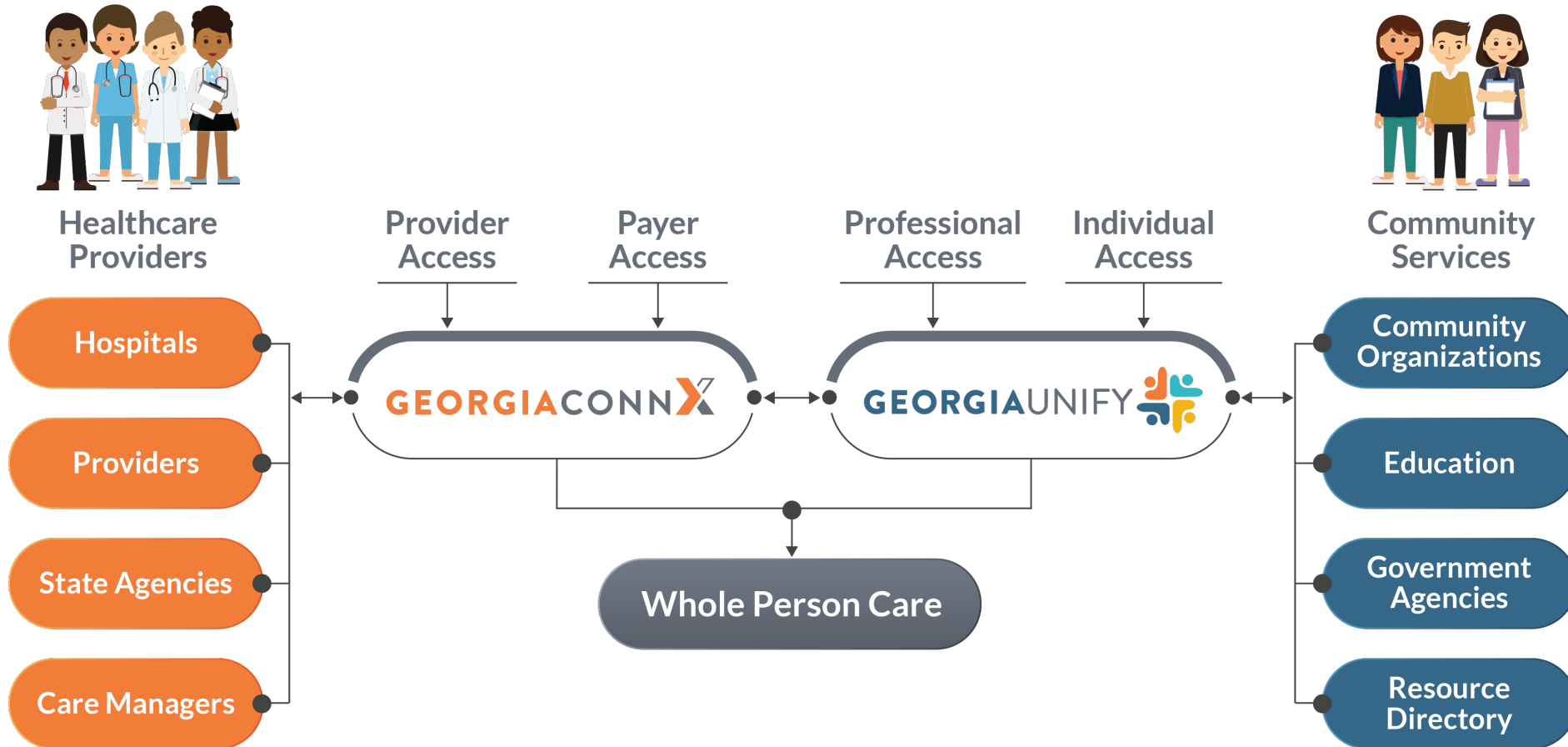
GaHIN's social care integration platform facilitates referrals and coordination of services for effective whole person care throughout the community.

# What Capabilities Can GeorgiaUnify Provide?



## Social Risk Screenings

Social care assessment and/or screening data on an individual captured and/or analyzed to determine risks and needs. GaHIN can aggregate, link and share SDOH screening data.



## Reporting and Analytics

Capability to generate reports and engage in data analytics. GaHIN can collaborate to develop reporting and analytics capabilities for social care stakeholders.



## Resource Directory

Searchable directory of service providers across domains. GaHIN can work with social care stakeholders to build out and maintain a resource directory.



## Longitudinal Whole Person Records

Longitudinal record of an individual's health, social and/or behavioral health data, and related information connecting data from a patient's multiple providers and health services. GaHIN could integrate cross-sector data on an individual for whole-person care.



## Referral Management

Ability to send/receive referrals, track status, and close the loop GaHIN can support interoperability of referrals and connect referral platforms for stakeholders in the state.
